## INTRODUCTION

## ENGLISH QUIZ

This student survey is part of the "Word Articulation Project" (WAP) and it aims to collect information about students' English Language knowledge.

A total of 129 students for whom English is a second language participated in the survey. The survey was distributed within the 4 partner countries: Turkey, Bulgaria, Latvia and Italy. UK students were not involved in this survey due to the fact that their native language is English and the survey aimed to gather information about the English language proficiency of students who speak English as a second language.

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## How old are you?

The chart below shows that most of the respondents were 17 years old accounting to $37 \%$ of the respondents, followed by 16 year olds with $23 \%$.


## What is your gender?

Most of the respondents were female, $70 \%$, out of the 129 respondents.

The chart below shows that most of the respondents were from Italy with $30 \%$, followed by Turkey with $28 \%$, then Latvia and Bulgaria.

$82 \%$ of the respondents voted for "wrote", which was the correct answer. However, $181 \%$ of respondents made a grammatical mistake and did not provide the correct answer.

## Conclusions

Based on the survey results, it is clear that the students have varying levels of knowledge in English grammar. The survey covered a range of grammatical concepts and tenses, including possessive pronouns, auxiliary verbs, verb tense agreement, and comparative adjectives.

Overall, the majority of respondents provided correct answers, with an accuracy range of $48 \%$ to $96 \%$. However, a significant minority of respondents (ranging from $8 \%$ to $52 \%$ ) made grammatical mistakes in their answers, indicating a need for further instruction and practice.

In terms of tenses, the survey covered present simple, present continuous, past simple, past continuous, present perfect, and future perfect. Most respondents demonstrated an understanding of these tenses, with correct answers ranging from $59 \%$ to $92 \%$. However, some respondents struggled with verb tense agreement and made mistakes in their answers.

Additionally, the survey covered other grammar rules such as possessive pronouns and comparative adjectives. The majority of respondents demonstrated an understanding of these concepts, with correct answers ranging from $64 \%$ to $90 \%$.

In conclusion, the survey results suggest that while the students have a solid understanding of basic English grammar concepts, there is room for improvement in certain areas. Further instruction and practice in these areas will likely lead to a higher level of accuracy and proficiency in English grammar.
